

## A Jewish Girl In Paris by Melanie Levensohn, translation by Jamie Lee Searle (Panmacmillan, £9.99)

Inspired by true events and set against the backdrop of the Second World War, Melanie Levensohn's powerful novel about forbidden love is an enthralling debut. This story starts in occupied Paris, 1940. A young Jewish girl, Judith, falls in love with the son of a wealthy banker and Nazi sympathiser – his family will never approve. As the Germans impose more and more restrictions on Jewish Parisians, the incredible danger they are in becomes apparent and the horror intensifies. The couple secretly plan to flee the country. But before they can make their escape, Judith vanishes.


Montréal, 1982. Shortly before his death, Lica Grunberg reveals to his daughter, Jacobina, that she has or had an older half-sister, Judith. Lica escaped the Nazis but has no idea what happened to his first-born. Jacobina vows to find the sister she never knew. Her search languishes for years, until she is spurred on by her young friend Béatrice, who, with problems of her own, is looking for a distraction.

The two women discover a dark family secret, that stretches over two continents and six decades, This beautiful, heart-wrenching novel accurately examines the harsh realities of war whilst remaining hopeful and celebrating resilience and love.
